


I stopped sippin' long enough to give thanks to the man above for all the beauty I've been surrounded with.

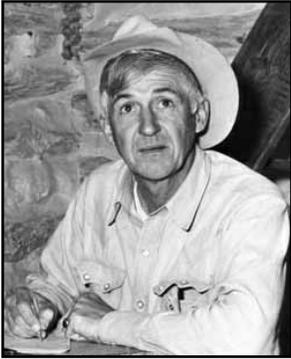



They don't even go after the resident brave mouse Mickey, who has actually been photographed eating their cat food. He comes out regularly from a hole under the bar counter.





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
